



PLAYER OF THE WEEK

SAM TONEY • New Jersey City University
Sophomore • Forward • Plainfield, NJ/Williamstown

Toney earns his first NJAC Player of the Week honor of the 2017-18 season after a monster week in leading NJCU to two conference wins and the first 7-0 start since 1991-92. He averaged 33.0 points, 13.0 rebounds, 2.0 blocks, 1.0 assists, and 0.5 steals while going 23-for-47 from the field and draining eight three-pointers. He scored 36 points and pulled down 17 boards in an 87-83 overtime win over William Paterson, marking the most points scored in a single game by an NJCU player in the 24-year history of the NJCU's home court. He went 11-for-24, including four three-pointers. He followed up with a second straight 30-point effort in an 86-83 road win at Rutgers-Camden, going 12-for-23 and swishing four more threes. Toney currently leads all NJAC players in scoring (21.9 ppg) and made threes (3.1/game); he also ranks third in defensive rebounds (7.4 rpg), fourth in overall rebounding (9.3 rpg), and sixth in blocked shots (1.1 bpg).



ROOKIE OF THE WEEK

CHIKA WOSU • New Jersey City University
Freshman • Center • Jersey City, NJ/University Academy Charter

Wosu, the younger brother of two-time NJAC Defensive Player of the Year Chinwe Wosu, earns his first NJAC Rookie of the Week honor after a breakout week helped the Gothic Knights to two more wins. NJCU moves to 7-0 for the first time since the 1991-92 season. Wosu averaged 11.5 points and 7.5 rebounds as NJCU defeated both William Paterson and Rutgers-Camden. He was one rebound shy of a double-double, scoring 12 points and pulling down nine boards in an 87-83 win over the Pioneers. He went 6-for-10, and added an assist and blocked shot. He added 11 points on 5-for-10 shooting along with six rebounds in the 86-83 win over the Scarlet Raptors, in just 16 minutes off the bench. Wosu shot 55 percent on the week (11-for-20), and 11 of his 15 rebounds were on the offensive glass. He currently ranks fourth among all NJAC players in offensive rebounds (2.7 rpg), and is eighth in the conference with a 53.8 percent shooting clip.
